For those of us who need a plan with time increments let me offer this one: block out one hour today—for 30 minutes give thanks for all that 2016 was and grieve for that it was not. For the second half-hour dream dreams of all that things that you hope will happen this year—realistic or not. And, finally, list the dreams that you will help along to reality and the ways you will do that.

If you do this, you will have answered both questions. You will know where the march of time is leading you and you will know that you have spent time with the ONE who is leading you and how you will follow.
