Decolonizing Church: Why Making Change Requires Being Changed

Presenter: Naomi Christine Leapheart

Creating sustained, effective faith-based movements for justice requires more than cool hashtags, strongly-worded statements, and occasional protests. In order to bring about change for our communities, congregations must be willing to take an introspective look at how the principles of colonization, domination, greed operate in full force within our own walls. This workshop will explore the ways in which racism, classism, patriarchy, heterosexism, and xenophobia have become Christian practices, and what we can do to uproot these practices in our churches so that we can be equipped to fight for lasting justice. Time permitting, we will make action plans for doing congregational "audits" and use a case study to explore how a decolonized church would tackle a specific injustice facing our region today.

21st Century Discipleship: You can teach an old church new tricks!
