A Word From the Associate Conference Minister for Search & Call

There is so much going on this fall in our country and in Conference in the coming few months that it's sometimes hard to know where to spend our time. We have multiple opportunities to discuss the possible Keystone Conference, as well as an important vote on Saturday, November 9, to gauge the will of our Conference to go forward into a new and different future. And certainly, there are so many other good events happening in our local churches to draw our attention and time. However, I want to highlight something that I think will deeply benefit congregations and pastors, which is the "Fractured Lives, Fractured Churches" workshop being offered on Saturday, October 12 from 9 AM to 3 PM at Church of the Good Shepherd UCC in Boyertown.

This workshop is being presented through the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center and is designed to address the estrangement we're experiencing from each other in the world that has now filtered down to our local churches, and how the church can be a place that heals and restores rather than a place that simply mirrors our divided world. The basis of the workshop is family systems theory, something I learned briefly about in seminary, but was introduced to more thoroughly by a lovely Lutheran couple that befriended this new pastor in the late nineties. I often say that two things changed my life for the better – Jesus and GPS – but it's really three things: the third was understanding that churches are like families, with all the positive and negative dynamics that happen with those we love and struggle to love. Knowing this truth changed my personal life, and it forever changed my ministry with the churches I served. Whether your church knows how to handle the estrangement and division well, or is struggling to do so, this workshop is for you, both laity and clergy. It's free and you can bring as many people as we can fit into the room. Join us!
